The Basics

The screen

Wallpaper

This is the background you see on your desktop when you switch your computer on.

How to change the wallpaper on Windows

1. Right-click your desktop and choose Personalise.
2. Select Picture from the Background drop-down list.
If you don't like Microsoft's picture offerings, click the Browse button to search your own Pictures folder for potential backgrounds.
3. Decide whether to fill, fit, stretch, tile, or centre the picture.
4. Click the Save Changes button to save your new background.

How to change the wallpaper on Mac

1. Right click on your desktop and select 'Change Desktop Background'
2. Decide how the picture fills the screen from the pull-down list

The Mouse

Buttons and scrolling

By default, the left button is the main mouse button, and is used for common tasks such as selecting objects or tasks and double-clicking.

The right mouse button is often used to open contextual menus, which are pop-up menus that change depending where you click. For example, if you right click on the desktop, you may see a menu pop up that includes "Personalise" (see above)." If you right click on a folder, the menu might include options such as "Open" and "Properties.". The Right click often gives you a menu with choices of features.

Your mouse may have a scroll wheel that allows you to scroll up and down pages.

You can change the direction of scrolling in if you prefer the 'Australian' scrolling by going to Settings>Devices>touchpad and changing the scroll direction in the 'scroll and zoom section'.

GGB Recommendation: Mac users should enable the right button in Apple>System Preferences>Mouse

Selecting with the Mouse

Selecting files

- Left-clicking a single file will select that file and deselect all others.
- **Control** + left-clicking a single file will toggle the selection state of that file, leaving all others unchanged (i.e. **Control**+left-click to select, repeat to deselect).
- **Shift** + left-clicking lets you select a range of files.
Left-click to select the first file in the range, then hold the **Shift** key and click again on the last file in the range. All files between and including those two will be selected.

Selecting text

- Use the mouse to highlight text by left-click and drag the cursor over it.
- To select a word, double-click it.
- To select a single line of text, click in the left margin next to the line.
- To select a sentence, hold down [Ctrl] and then click anywhere in the sentence.
- To select a paragraph, click three times in the paragraph. Alternatively, click twice in the left margin next to the paragraph.
- To select the entire document, click three times in the left margin.

Track Pad

This is the large pad/button in the middle of the computer case, at the bottom of the keyboard.

In addition to the buttons, the track pad allows certain finger gestures, these are the most useful;

- **Tap one finger on the touchpad:** same as left-clicking a mouse.
- **Tap two fingers on the touchpad:** same as right-clicking a mouse.
- **Swipe up or down with two fingers:** Scroll a page up or down.
- **Pinch or stretch out two fingers:** Zoom in or zoom out (magnify or shrink).

For more gestures, please see the Advanced Trackpad gestures

GGB Recommendation: Mac users change the settings for this in Apple>System Preferences>Mouse

Customising the Mouse and Cursor in Windows

1. In Settings select Devices>Mouse & Touchpad
2. In the *Mouse Properties* window that appears, select the *Pointers* tab.
3. Click the *scheme* drop-down menu.
4. Select and apply a scheme.
5. This is also where you can change the button configuration. To increase or decrease the double-click speed and trails etc. you need to select the 'Additional mouse options'

Some PC's do not display all of the options on this page, if that is the case, you can reach these using the following;

1. Click on the windows icon on the bottom left of your screen and enter control panel in the search box to find the Control Panel app.
2. Run the Control Panel app.
3. Select Hardware and sound
4. Under 'devices and printers' you will find a link to 'Mouse' which will take you to where you can change the speed, and cursor settings.

The Display

Customising font size for the Windows desktop

1. Right click on the desktop and select Display settings.
2. Select "Change the size of text, apps..." to make text bigger, if you want it even bigger than the options displayed, chose "Advanced scaling settings". This won't apply universally until you reboot or log out and in.

Accessibility options

There are many more options for the display, mouse etc, e.g. make the display have a higher contrast, these are accessed from Control Panel> Appearance and Personalisation>Ease of Access Center.

Cut and Paste

As the name implies this is a technique for moving a file or some text from one place to another.

1. Select the item to move by left click and swipe over the item releasing the mouse button at the end of the selection
2. Press <CTRL>x (<command>x on MAC) and the item will be removed and placed in a special location in memory called the clipboard
3. Move the cursor to where you want the item to end up and press <CTRL>v (<command>v on MAC) and it will be copied out of the clipboard to the location you have selected.

Note you can also use this technique for copy and paste in which case you use <CTRL>c (<command>c on MAC) after you have made your selection.

Drag and drop

Drag and drop is a technique for moving files (or words and sentences form one place to another). Simply select the item(s) you want to move by swiping over it as above, then place your cursor in the middle of the selection and with the left mouse button pressed move the cursor to where you want it/them to end up and release the cursor. It is recommended you only use this after you have practiced it.

Applications

An Application is a computer program that performs an activity for the user, the most popular Applications are;

There are several ways of starting (launching) applications;

Launching applications on Windows 10

- Click on the application icon on the bar at the bottom of the screen
- Double click on an application on the desktop
- Click on the windows icon and scroll through the list.
- Click on the windows icon and enter the name in the search box

Launching applications on Mac.

- Click on the application on the bar at the bottom of the screen
- Click on an application on the desktop
- Launch finder and select from the Applications folder
- Click on the search icon (top right) and enter the name of the application.

Applications Vs Shortcut.

You normally only have one copy of an application or document on your computer; however, you may want to access it from different places (see above). This is achieved using shortcuts (alias on Mac), these are simply pointers to where it actually lives.

GGB Recommendation: Do not use desktop shortcuts for frequently used web pages, they simply clutter your desktop, use the browser's bookmarks instead.

Creating a shortcut using Windows 10

e.g. to create a desktop shortcut

1. Click on the Windows Start menu icon.
2. Find the application you want to use by scrolling through the Apps list at the left side of the menu.
3. Once you've found it, drag and drop it from your Start menu to your desktop. You'll see the word "Link" appear when you're hovering over the desktop.
4. Release the mouse button to create the desktop shortcut.

Creating a shortcut using Mac OSX

e.g. to create a desktop shortcut

1. Open the Applications folder using Finder
2. Right click on the application you want to copy and select create Alias this will create a file with the suffix '.app alias'
3. Drag-and-drop or copy/paste this file into the desktop folder

The Desktop

How to tidy the Desktop

1. Delete any unwanted shortcuts or move them to the task bar at bottom of screen
2. Create folders
3. Right click on the background and select appropriate view and sort options
4. Use Chrome's Bookmarks Bar rather than having lots of links on the desktop

How to handle Multiple windows

You can have many applications running at the same time. Whenever you launch an application it opens in a new Window. If these are full size, you cannot see what else you have running as they will be hidden behind the current application.

GGB Recommendation: only have full screen windows when you really need them, e.g. when viewing videos.

The disk drive

If you power down your computer all of the information in its memory is lost. The disk drive holds all of your permanent information. If you put your computer to sleep it overcomes the loss of memory by saving it to disk before it shuts down and loading it back in again when it wakes up.

Where to save information

Disk drives are organised in folders, just like a filing cabinet. All computers come with some pre-defined folders;

In order to find folders and files, use explorer on Windows and Finder on Mac. The standard folders are under `c:\users\yourusername\...` on windows and `/Users/yourusername/...` on Mac.

GGB Recommendations: create folders below the pre-defined ones to make it easy to find things.

How to create a folder on Windows 10

1. Navigate to the parent folder where you wish to create your new folder using Explorer
2. Click on New and select New folder from the pull-down menu that appears
3. Rename your new folder

How to create a folder on Mac

1. Navigate to the parent folder where you wish to create your new folder using Finder
2. Click on <Action> and select New folder from the pull-down menu that appears
3. Rename your new folder

Essential software

The following are essential things to install on a new computer;

Anti-Virus

Note that many computers come with 'free' antivirus software that needs to be paid for after the first year.

GGB Recommendation: Remove the pre-installed anti-virus and install AVG free.

Browser

Google Chrome is a little faster than Edge and is better if you use both Mac and Windows.

GGB Recommendation: If you use multiple machines use Chrome, if you are MAC and iPhone user use Safari, otherwise if only Windows devices use Edge.

Word Processor

Microsoft Office is the de-facto word processor used by most companies; however, it is not free. It comes in 2 versions a one-off fee or a monthly subscription (called Office365). Beware of one-off copies of Office costing less than £50, many are NOT legitimate.

GGB Recommendation: Unless you really need Microsoft Office, install Open Office.

The instructions in this booklet assume Open Office is installed.

Open Office Text

Fonts



To change the font or size


1. Highlight text you would like to change
2. Go to the top menu toolbar and click on where you see numbers (under where it says FONT)
3. Scroll down until you see the size of font you want, click on it. You will see your highlighted font has changed.

The default font is Times New Roman, and looks like this;

Calibri is a popular font that is more readable - He heard quiet steps behind him. That didn't bode well. Who could be following him this late at night and in this deadbeat part of town?

Courier is a useful font when you want columns to align as it is not a proportional font i.e. every letter is the same width.

You can also use the buttons in the formatting bar to make text **BOLD**, Underlined, or *italic* for added emphasis, and there is also a colour button as well. 

Fancy Fonts

Open Office has a fancy fonts tool called Fontwork, this is accessed via the drawing toolbar; make sure that the drawing toolbar is visible by <View><Toolbars><Drawing>.



Click on the Fontwork Gallery icon  to see the various options

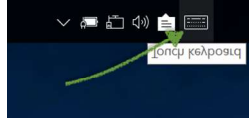
Accents

To insert an accented character, go to <insert><Special Character>

Emojis

The following only work in certain applications, most notably not in Open Office where you need to load a plug-in for Emojis.

Inserting an Emoji on Windows



1. Open the Touch Keyboard in the bottom right corner of your screen, if you don't see it go to Settings>Change PC Settings>PC and Devices>Typing to enable it
2. Move your cursor to where you want the emoji
3. Click on the smiley face emoji icon
4. Choose your emoji

Inserting an emoji on Mac

1. Move cursor to where you want the emoji
2. Press <Command><Control><Space> simultaneously
3. Click on the emoji you want from the display

Styles and templates

Styles

Styles are used to save text formats so it's easy to re-use them over and over again, if you use styles you can ensure that your document has a consistent look and it is easy to completely change the format of a document with just a few keystrokes.

To see the styles and formatting window, select <Format><Styles and Formatting> and a pop-up menu will appear.

By default, when you start typing a document the text has the 'Text body' style. To change this style, right click on the 'Text body' item in the styles and formatting window and select modify. Make the changes you want and see what happens.

At the top of the Styles and formatting window are buttons that allow you to see the different categories of styles, it's here that you can change the default style of bulleted and numbered lists.

You can also create your own styles if you repeatedly have to use a style not already catered for.

Styles can very quickly become very complicated, so use them with caution.

Templates

Templates are pre-formatted documents e.g. letters, that you can use to quickly start documents you regularly use.

To create a document using a template select <File><New><Templates and Documents> and select the template.

You can create templates from scratch or download standard ones from <https://templates.openoffice.org/en> where there are thousands of examples.

If you download a template to your downloads folder, you can import it into OpenOffice by <File><Templates><Organize>, then in the dialog that appears, right click on 'My Templates' and select import to import it.

To create a template from scratch, start by making the changes you want to a new document then choose <File><Templates><Save> to open the Templates dialog, enter a name in the New Template field and select which category to store it under.

To make a template the default, select <File><Templates><Organize>, then double-click the folder containing the template that you want to set as the default, Click the template that you want to set as the default, then select 'Set As Default Template' from the <Commands> button.

To edit a template, select <File><Templates><Organize> then chose my Templates and right click on the template you wish to edit and click <edit>.

Exercise

1. Download the MCC default letter template from <https://godartbrowncom.ipage.com/MCC/index.pl?items=openoffice> to your downloads folder.
2. Import this into Open Office.
3. Edit it to add your address instead of the template.
4. Save it.
5. Create a new letter using your new template.

Exercise:

Click on the buttons in the formatting bar at the top of the page to experiment with the various word wrapping options .



Two Column pages or sections

This section has 2 columns.

It was created by inserting a new section and choosing the number of columns, but you can also set up the entire document to have 2 columns in <Format><Page><Columns>

By default, it splits the text evenly between both columns, but you can override this in <format><sections><options>, then you can create a column break wherever you want with <Insert><Manual break><column>

Formatting Pictures

Insert a picture into your document using <Insert><Picture><from file>. After this you will want to make sure that the text flows around the image.

In this example the picture is wrapped AFTER the text. Right click on the image to see its settings. Wrap is set to 'Optimal page wrap' and the <picture><settings><wrap> is 'before'.

Sometimes you want even greater control, in which case use a table with an invisible border. In this case I've left it visible so you can see what's going on. To make the border invisible when you come to print click on <Table><Table Properties><borders> and click on the no-border icon.

Page flow

To insert a hard page break in your document, move to where you want to make the break and select <Insert><Manual break> and choose 'page'.

Often, especially when creating a document, you want to make sure that text is kept together, like not splitting a page in the middle of a paragraph or keeping a heading with the following paragraph.

It is thus better practice to avoid hard breaks and use other techniques instead.

To stop a paragraph being split by a page break, right click on the paragraph, and select 'Paragraph', then click on 'Text Flow' and select 'Do not split paragraph'.

Similarly, you can keep paragraphs together so they both don't get split. Right click on the first paragraph, and select 'Paragraph', then click on 'Text Flow' and select 'Keep with next paragraph'.

Heading breaks

To force a page break before a heading or a paragraph, right click on the paragraph, and select 'Paragraph', then click on 'Text Flow' and select insert Page break before.

Tables

Insert a table into your document by moving to where you want to place it and select <Table><Insert> then choose how many rows and columns you want, you don't have to be too accurate here as you can add or delete rows and columns later by right-clicking in the cell you wish to delete or insert after and selecting row or column, then insert or delete.

Notes;

- The styles 'Table Heading' and 'Table Contents' have been used and edited in this table.
- The heading row is set so that it repeats at the top of each page <Table><Heading rows repeat>
- Other cells have been centred, merged and the borders changed.

Open Office Calc

Introduction

A spreadsheet is a grid of cells, each cell can contain text, numbers or formulas. Spreadsheets can be extremely large and complex, for the purposes of this crib sheet we are only going to describe the simplest scenarios.

Text and number cells

Text and numbers typed into a cell can be formatted in the same way as in the Open Office text editor described above, so we won't duplicate this here. However, there are some additional options that are changed by selecting the cells, rows or columns you want to format and choosing <format><cells> from the top menu bar. This has tabs for number formatting, fonts, alignment, borders and background. The number format has several options for money fields (e.g. include £ sign)

Cell references

Cells are referenced by a column letter followed by a row number, the cell at the top left is A1. If you have a cell that you use in a number of formulas, e.g. a rate of exchange, you can name cells in the box just above the top left cell. You can specify a range of cells using a : e.g. A1:A5 contains A1, A2, A3, A4 and A5.

Formulas

Typing an = sign at the start of a cell tells the spreadsheet that this cell contains a formula. If you wanted the contents in C1 to be A1 added to B1, you would type =A1+B1 into cell C1, then if you change A1 or B1, the contents of C1 will automatically recalculate to reflect the change. Similarly, if A1 was the price per unit and B1 was the number of units, typing =A1*B1 into C1 would make C1 contain the total cost of these items.

Some of the most common formulas are in the table below.

Formula	Result
=A1+B1	A1 is added to B1
=A1-B1	B1 is subtracted from A1
=A1*B1	A1 is multiplied by B1
=A1/B1	A1 is divided by B1
=ROUND(A1/B1;2)	A1 is divided by B1 and rounded to 2 decimal places
=sum(A1:15)	A1+A2+A3+A4+A5

Table 6: Commonly used formulas

Sorting

1. Select the cells or rows you want to sort, by wiping over with the mouse.
2. Select <data><sort> from the top bar
3. Chose the column to sort on and type of sort.

Filtering

If you want to quickly to see the rows that match a particular criterion, e.g. all the rows that contain "Roses", select the rows you are interested in as above, then select <Data><filter><standard filter> and then fill in the criteria.

GIMP

GIMP is the GNU Image Manipulation Program, it is used for drawing and for editing photographs. It is a huge application, however there are many excellent tutorials on the subject on the internet, for example <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=x6pXJ7ljr0>

During our sessions on GIMP, the following came up which are not covered on the tutorial above.

How to create a Signature file with a transparent background.

Method 1 using the mouse to draw your signature;

- Create a new image in GIMP, make sure you have Advanced option Background colour set to Transparent in the New image dialogue
- Make sure the background shows the checkerboard Transparent display
- Chose the pencil tool and a suitable colour and size and draw your signature with the mouse
- Export the resultant image as a .png file

Method 2 from a scan.

- Scan your signature from a piece of paper
- Open the image in GIMP
- Right click on the Background Layer on the RHS of the screen and “Add Alpha Channel”
- Use the Fuzzy select tool to select the white space around your signature and hit the delete key to remove it, the checkerboard should show though.
- Carry on with fuzzy select and other paint tools to refine the image
- Export the resultant image as a .png file

































































- **Swipe up with three fingers:** Show all recent activity and open windows via Windows Timeline.


